The Somerville Board of Aldermen established the Somerville Advisory Bicycle Committee (SBC) in 2001. The SBC works to improve conditions for bicyclists in the city, promote bicycling as a means of transportation, improve safety conditions for bicyclists, and to help implement bicycle policy, programs, and routes for all ages and abilities.

Approximately 5% of Somerville residents commute by bicycle¹. This is nearly a three-fold increase over two decades (1990, 2%; 2000, 3%)². The increase of bicyclists in the city has paralleled the improving conditions for bicycling in Somerville (see Map 1: Existing Bicycle Facilities). These improvements over the past two decades include traffic calming measures, the Community Path, bicycle lanes and City-sponsored community bike rides.

The SBC plans to continue with these improvements over the next decade in order to increase both bicycle facilities and public outreach to encourage new bicyclists in Somerville. Our overall goal is 10% of Somerville residents traveling by bicycle in 2020.

GOALS FOR 2020

To continue the growth of bicycling in the city, and attain 10% bicyclists by 2020, the SBC has charted the following key elements to reach this goal:

 Complete the Community Path, to provide a direct, car-free route from Somerville to Boston via Brickbottom & North Point. The path currently ends at Cedar Street.

- Provide Bike Route Signage, to help bicyclists navigate our neighborhood streets and avoid roads with greater motor vehicle traffic where possible.
- Provide Bicycle Facilities on all Major City Roads, to provide safe and efficient facilities for bicyclists to travel throughout the city.
- Increase Access to Bike Parking:
 - » Install public bike racks in all business areas and at most 1/4 mile apart in residential areas, and
 - » Provide centralized and preferably sheltered parking facilities at main commercial centers, civic areas and transit stations.
- Institute City-Wide Bike Share Program with the MAPC (Metropolitan Area Planning Council), to facilitate flexible, seamless bicycle travel with neighboring cities and transit.
- Update Zoning to Anticipate Increased Bicycle Use, which will place a greater demand on private bicycle parking facilities than currently required by zoning.
- Calm Street Traffic, so bicyclists of every age and ability can travel comfortably throughout the city.
- Educate Grade School Students to Operate Bicycles in the City, such that, with calmed vehicular traffic, 20% or more of Somerville students will bicycle to school.
- Educate Everybody about City Cycling, so drivers, bicyclists and pedestrians, of all languages and backgrounds, know the rights and responsibilities of bicycling in Somerville.

• Prepare More Bicycle Promotion Programs and Materials, to provide all Somerville residents with the encouragement and support to be a Somerville Cyclist.

Each of these elements will help Somerville residents to bicycle more. The following measures will allow the City to chart its progress and provide feedback to optimize available funds.

- Annual Bicycle Counting, to chart bicycle usage; led by the SBC in coordination with the OSPCD.
- Regular Enforcement and Recording of Dangerous Traffic Behavior; led by the Police Department.
- Annual Bicycle Accident & Incident Report, to assess both problem locations and problem behaviors; led by the SBC in coordination with the OSPCD (data sources may include MassDOT, MAPC, CTPS, City Police Reports, and other local sources).

Together, these efforts will help the SBC achieve its long term vision of a network of bicycle facilities throughout Somerville (see Map 2: Bicycle Facilities, Long Term Vision).




INITIATIVES FOR 2010


The SBC intends to explore of a few key initiatives for 2010 (see Map 3: 2010 Bicycle Proposals). These initiatives would build on the City's past accomplishments and work towards our 2020 goals. We plan to work with the City on the following:

- Expand the on-street bicycle facilities network, potential facilities include:
 - » Extend the Willow Avenue bike lane with sharrows to Ball Square
 - » Install bike lanes and advisory bike lanes on Cedar Street
 - » Install advisory bike lanes on Mossland Street
 - » Install advisory bike lanes and/or bike lanes on Summer Street
 - » Install sharrows, advisory bike lanes and/or bike lanes on College Street

- Explore the potential to add bike parking in Union and Davis Squares, where bicycles regularly exceed available bicycle racks, by providing large on-street bicycle racks.
- Develop a bicycle wayfinding network built upon the Community Path and neighborhood streets to link major commercial, civic and transportation centers.
- Include cyclists' need for pavement quality into the City's annual road reconstruction process.
- Assist the City and MassDOT in design and funding of the Community Path extension.
- Assist the City to install 100 bike racks in business districts and commercial corridors throughout the city.
